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Member Groups' Reports

Chelmsford Member Group

2 October 2011 - Twelve riders set off; two were new: young George, aged nine, and his dad. We kept the pace steady and enjoyed the sun and countryside. It was 29°C. Everybody was in shorts and T-shirts. The tandem was going well, as we headed to Heybridge Basin via Russell Green, Mowden and Langford.

After tea and cake, six riders went on to the "Ferry Boat Inn" at North Fambridge. As we passed the Maldon Park, hundreds of people were enjoying the October sun. There was an Open Day on Northey Island, but no time for that. At Fambridge we went down to the river, which was also busy with many small boats.

After a sandwich and a pint of Guinness, it was on to "Bunsay Downs Golf Club" for afternoon tea. Sitting outside in the sun, we enjoyed the rest of a very pleasant day. **Brian Taylor**

23 October 2011 - Seven riders set off from Chelmsford on a fine, cool autumn morning. The mellow sunshine lit up the turning leaves to

blissful effect. Aided by a following breeze, we reached Thaxted at five to eleven.

Ascending the medieval cobbles that lead to "Poppy's Tearoom", we met with another group of cyclists, who were evidently preparing to depart. They informed us that they had ridden from Cambridge (in kilometres) and, unaware of its strict 11am opening time, had supposed the teashop to be closed. Suitably reappraised, they stayed so that the premises, (after five more CTC riders had joined us), contained eighteen cyclists loudly chatting away. Whilst serving us, Poppy proudly mentioned that hers had just been voted the Number 1 Teashop in Essex - well deserved in my opinion.

The route to Debden took us past two reminders of the tension between pastoral beauty and the needs of our modern technological society. Firstly, there was the ridiculously "disguised-as-a-tree" phone mast near Cutlers Green, followed by the completely no-frills brutally utilitarian Henham Microwave mast, which we passed on the track leading to Widdington.

Coincidentally, during that week there had been a great deal of debate about pylon design, "eyesores" and so on, both in the national press and on TV. In this context, the Henham mast deserves a special mention for its sheer ugliness. A technical description might be "a 200-foot rectangular open-lattice tower, built on a square base but asymmetrical in shape so that its highest point sits over one corner." Put more subjectively, it resembles a pile of old scaffolding, from which you might expect the finished structure to eventually emerge. In architectural terms: it's a giant's pile of Kerplunk sticks, designed by a demented Cubist, or something a six-year old might have built from Meccano, whilst high on Smarties.

Nine of us arrived at Debden, where one ex-pub is now a "Nepalese" restaurant and the other has gone all "gastro". Having shelled out £4.95 for a very small portion of soup accompanied by a slice of supermarket bread (which took 40-minutes to arrive), I remain unimpressed.

Tea was taken at Blake End, as the group dispersed homewards so ending our "no-lights" rides once more, for several months to come. **Adrian Leeds**

27th November 2011 - Thank goodness, the 90mph winds in Scotland didn't afflict Essex today, but it was windy enough to make cycling hard

work unless you were heading down-wind. The sideways gusts were distinctly de-stabilising at times. Our destination for elevenses was the "Blue Egg" at Bardfield, but I didn't want to use one of the established routes. Listening to comments from behind me such as "where's he going next?" just encouraged me, as we made our way west of Broomfield, then to Rayne station, where we used the Flitchway to avoid the built-up area. The sun was now shining as we climbed the long slope up towards Great Saling and on to the "Blue Egg". Peter Tibbets and others joining us there made the numbers up to nine, of whom seven went on to an excellent lunch at "The Bell" in Castle Hedingham. A stiff headwind made the first part of the return trip quite arduous and we were glad of a tea stop at Rayne station, before heading for home in failing light. Cycle Champions

The Bricklayer's Arms,

Bikes, helmets, etc. can be provided free of charge. All rides start from the container by skate ramps at Colchester Leisure World *except where indicated*.

Alan Palmer's Monday - Weekly at **10am** from Colchester Leisure World. 30-40 miles out to the countryside with lunch stop.

Monday - Weekly at **12.15pm**: Short ride for those <u>50+</u> with a coffee stop

Tuesday - 1st and 3rd of the month at **7pm**: <u>Evening ride</u> to a village pub, typically around 15 miles 2nd of the month at **12pm**: Short taster <u>Riverside ride</u>

The <u>Garrison ride</u> - every **Tuesday** at **10am** - starts from the Musket Club -Homefield, Fallowfield Rd. A gentle paced family ride in association with the Garrison NHS Health Trainer Service. Bikes, child seats, and trailers are available for free hire.

Wednesday - Weekly at **11am**: <u>Back to Health</u> ride in association with LEAP (Life Enhancing Activity Programme). Local ride to one of several cafes around town; neither far nor fast, this is the best-attended ride.

2nd and 4th of the month at **9.30am**: <u>Cycling Sisters</u> (women only) ride around the countryside, something like 20 miles; faster and further than the others. They start from Highwood's Tesco

Thursday - 4th Thursday of the month at **12pm**: Short Lunchtime ride

NEWTS (North Essex Wednesday Tipplers) - Thursday - Weekly at **7.15pm** from Colchester Tenpin. Distance somewhere between 15 and 20 miles, to get to a village pub for **9pm**. This is by Pete Finch who runs it under the <u>Suffolk DA</u> umbrella. (The name has stuck despite the change of day...)

Saturday - 1st and 3rd of the month at **11am**: A gentle <u>Family ride</u> usually to a nearby village pub.

South East Essex Member Group

23rd October 2011 – Flat as a pancake - Nineteen riders assembled at Wickford and then split into two groups. One headed out via Battlesbridge and the other via Rettendon heading for the "Roundbush Café". The first group arrived at 11am and were soon tucking into toast, scrambled & fried eggs and teacakes (although Karen H was disappointed that John S had the last one). There was no sign of the other group and we eventually received a text to say that Martin P had 3 punctures. The remaining group eventually arrived at 11.35am, but without him & Brian P, who had stayed to help him fix yet another puncture. By the time they arrived he had succumbed to 5 punctures – that must be a SEG all time record.

Twelve riders went onto "The Sportsman" at Nounsley and we were joined by Martin & Brian later. Thankfully, he had no further punctures.

Brian Eves joined us at Brentwood and eleven riders went onto "The Duck" at Newney Green.

John S brought his wife by car and we were all seated together in the restaurant for lunch, where we were entertained by a magician with his sleight of hand tricks. Luckily, no one volunteered to be sawn in half, although I did think that John S would have been a willing victim!

6th November 2011 – Ssshh, it's a secret - As a number of SEG members live in Shoeburyness, the first of the month ride was to the "Beehive" café in Rochford. And this meant we could all have an extra hour or two in bed. Ian M, John S and Mike S arrived at the café about 10.30am and found Julie P, Alan S, Colin B, Dennis F, Chris S and Bob K already there. Robin Carlyle, his son and brother arrived, followed by Brian P and Peter H. While we were waiting for the remaining riders, Colin B explained to Ian M the meaning of various hand signals, particularly one and two fingered salutes. As the remaining riders were coming via the seafront, John S said he would wait for them. We set off on a circular ride out to Canewdon and Stambridge, before returning to Rochford and then onto Great Wakering. Altogether, thirteen went onto

the "Red Lion", except Brian P who went to the "Shepherd & Dog" – he prefers real ale.

Six called in at a new café in Shoeburyness for afternoon tea, it was called "Charlotte's Secret Tearoom" and we were soon tucking into strawberry gateaux, chocolate squares and flapjacks all washed down with tea or coffee and best of all, it was free. As it's a secret, I couldn't possible tell you the location.

20th November 2011 – Cast your vote - There was no official ride today, due to the DA AGM but Peter H, Paul H, Dave H and Gill (a new rider from Stock) did meet at Wickford for a short ride. 27th November 2011 – Ssshh, it's another secret - Fourteen riders met at Wickford and split into two groups to head for the "Secret Garden Tearoom" in Chelmsford. Peter W led six riders via Stock, Margaretting and Writtle, while Ian M led eight riders via Galleyend, Deadman's Lane, Chelmer Park and Moulsham. The tearoom had 14 places set for us in a separate room with freshly brewed coffee and tea on the table when we arrived. Peter H was impressed with the good value.

Eight went onto "The Brewer's Arms" at Bicknacre via Sandon and Danbury. We were joined in the pub by Lynda C and Ian C (carassisted, as Ian was dropping treasurer's records off and Lynda is immobile at present). Afternoon tea was taken at the "Haybarn Café" in Battlesbridge and another good day was had by all.

11th December 2011 – DA Xmas meet - Peter H led 8 of us out of Wickford on an attractive ride through Downham, Stock and West Hanningfield to Great Baddow and the café at Bringy Pine. We were joined by Dave B and the runs secretary took the opportunity to discuss with members the proposed rides for the next six months. In future, where a **[DA] or [MG]** event occurs the local ride will include a lunch destination, but a specific pub will not be booked.

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ANNUAL TRAINING CAMPS

February, March, April and September

Seven went onto the "White Hart" at Margaretting Tye and we arrived just before it started to rain at 12 noon. Soon we were settled in the conservatory with our drinks and warm soup. When I needed sleep, I had 2 hours at one control and 2 hours at another and 1 hour in a bus shelter. Although Minutes of Meetings are not an exciting subject, they do catalogue the history of Essex CTC since the first meeting on 3rd December 1927. The Minutes Secretary of the time certainly deserved an award for diligence. In recent years with the introduction of computers, minutes are written up and circulated by e-mail. It's just not the same but it is so much easier.

Archivist Katharine Schofield told me that the Records Office does not have much material about cycling clubs in Essex and would welcome receiving more. I suspect there's plenty out there. Indeed the reception area of ERO has on the wall a magnificent black and white photo of a club of women cyclists wearing formal clothing about to ride on their sit up and beg bicycles. Apparently, that picture was taken by Fred Spalding, a well-known photographer of the time.

Although the Minutes have been deposited in the ERO, we will still be able to retrieve them, if necessary using our unique reference number.

If anybody does have other material to deposit in the ERO, then do let me know.

K Those Caravan Weekends

by Charles Comport Shakespeare wrote 'Old men forget' but although I cannot deny the passing years I remember that these weekends began in 1982, so 2012 is the 30th anniversary of these popular events. It all began when Swanage Caravan Park put an advert in the CTC magazine offering cheap weekend breaks off-season, starting in September. I thought this to be an ideal opportunity to explore somewhere away from our usual haunts and organised through the DA Committee an inter-section party. There were members from Brentwood. Chelmsford and South East sections - Havering were very weak at the time - who travelled down on Friday afternoon at various times in cars and train. I recall waiting at the camp entrance until a late hour to guide the later arrivals to their vans. The next day we visited Corfe Castle and rode up and down the steep Purbeck hills to Lulworth Cove. On Sunday, we visited Bovingdon Tank Museum, Cerne Abbas, to see the lusty 'Giant' and Tolpuddle of 'Martyrs' fame. The idea caught on and in 1983 we went to a camp near Mablethorpe in Lincolnshire where we toiled over the Wolds (who said Lincoln was flat?) to Caister returning along the Viking way and Walesby, where we visited the Church with its 'Travellers Window' depicting two cyclists. On Sunday, we visited Louth.

I was not involved in 1984 where, abandoning the coast, the DA party went up the Thames Valley, a trip organised by Ken and Peggy Thorndike. But returned in 1985 when the DA, now including Havering, went to Pakefield Holiday Park, near Lowestoft, and explored the Norfolk Broads. Norfolk proved to be a popular choice and we returned in 1986 to Overstrand during which we visited Wells-next-the-Sea and Holkham Hall, and in 1987 to Hunstanton. 1988 saw a complete change to Romney Sands Holiday village in Kent, which was notable for the howling gale we battled against to Rye and Winchelsea on Saturday followed on Sunday by a more peaceful ride on the Kent & Sussex Steam Railway. Some of us, who stayed to Monday, also had the Hythe, Dymchurch & Romney miniature railway, with our cycles crammed into the small carriages. A New Forest weekend came in 1989 based at Ringwood, visiting Bucklers Hard for lunch on Saturday followed the next day by a tour through Cranborne Chase to Shaftesbury, where a number of members rode up and down Gold Hill, featured in the 'Hovis' adverts.

A new decade saw the DA at Skegness where our slumbers were interrupted by a fracas in the small hours to which the police were called - nothing to do with us! It was back to Norfolk in 1991 at the Cromer Country Club revisiting the Broads. A return to Kent in 1992 saw us staying at Kingsdown nr Deal in odd, triangular shaped, wooden Chalets and in 1993, we went to St. Leonards, near Hastings visiting Battle. 1994 saw a return to Hunstanton, which I missed through ill health. By now impetus was waning a bit, but in 1996 weekend enthusiast George Welch took over and organised a weekend at Kessingland and in 1998 he arranged a weekend at Scratby, attended by most sections, where we visited the Norfolk coast and Broads again. But that proved to be the Caravan Weekend's swan song, although by now we were staying in chalets. Also the weekends were beginning to cost more.



They were very pleasant occasions, which brought the DA together and provided a spirit of unity, which perhaps needs encouraging today.

Obituary – John Greet (1934 - 2011)

Essex CTC, Essex DA Reunion Fellowship and the Easyriders Group in particular have lost a good supporter with the death of John, aged 77, on December 1st from a thrombosis. He joined the Romford Section in 1950/51 and became a regular rider, entering DA events including the Silver Jubilee Boundary Weekend in 1952. He also joined the DAs racing off-shoot, the Viking Road Club, but he was never a racing man. In the section, he met Joyce (Burt) and they married in the late 1950s. They

continued riding until the arrival of daughter Josie and then Phillip brought their cycling activities to a temporary halt and domesticity took over.

After the formation of EDARF in the mid-1960s, the Greets joined it and supported their activities, rides and functions. When free from family ties they commenced cycling once more riding out together. Later they were nominal members of the Brentwood Section and John was a marshal at Margaretting during the life of the 'Brentwood 75'. When the Windmill Rides began, the Greets took over the check at Chishill Windmill, the longest stint of all. John was an EDARF official for many years and also served on the DA Committee and he was still on the Certificate of Merit sub-committee until the end.

Despite a few health problems for John some years ago, the Greets continued to support the Easyriders, coming out by car. John was a friendly and affable colleague and the hearts of those who knew him were heavy at the news.
