Member Groups' Reports

Chelmsford Member Group

26th June 2016 - Windmill 210KM - This year's conditions were perfect for cycling with no rain, little wind and a bright fresh start. I tagged along with Jason and therefore made sound progress, pausing only briefly at Finchingfield for a chat with Tom Deakins, before heading off again. We flew through Belchamp St. Paul and were doing steady 14's between stops, so an impromptu "elevenses" at Clare outside the Co-op was a welcome breather and refuel. We made lunch at Greggs in Newmarket on time around one p.m. This was a more or less functional process involving a large coffee and a bland, doughy baguette with a rather hot chilli chicken filling. All grist to the mill anyway. By 4 o'clock we were in Saffron Walden, where we discovered a rather posh cyclists' café-cumcycle shop. (Town centre, opposite the public toilets). Although we had been heading towards the loos at the time, the delicious home-made Granola and fresh ground coffee proved too strong a draw and another refreshing stop was taken. (Note to self: Must go back there!).

The sugar and coffee propelled us up the long climb to Barley like 2 hyperactive children and from there we reached the Ugley club hut at half past 5. Another good rest was enjoyed at "Chez Victoria" with black coffee and yet more cake and choc bickies, served by our esteemed host, Brian Penny. 50km later I checked the Margaretting info clue before (at 128 miles into the ride!) - facing the fiendishly inserted London Hill (11%!). Anyhow, I got back to HQ in 11 hrs 24 minutes, greeted by the ever cheerful Stefan. My cycle computer said I'd been pedalling 9 and a half hours (including to-and-from mileage) so the arithmetic proves I spent roughly 2 hours eating and drinking. July 17th, 2016 - Leaving Chelmsford today we had 7 up. Adrian led us out to Danbury to give Dave S plenty of exercise on his Claud Butler fixie. Along The Ridge we encountered a team laying tar and chippings. Because the freshly laid chippings made riding difficult we resorted to using the pathway, as far as we could. Loose chippings continued down Spring Elms Lane so we turned off at the first opportunity. Some who had got ahead of the leader then went missing!

In Maldon there was some discussion where we were having our dorkey (see note at end), as there was a discrepancy between the Spotlight entry and that on the web site. We know one member didn't have the internet

so it had to be the Wilkins tearoom called "The Lock" at Heybridge Basin. Here we met three more members and finally the three we lost earlier.



European Cycle Touring Rallies

Some years ago, whilst on a European Cycle Rally in Belgium, we heard about weeks similar to the CTC Birthday rides: around 1,700 cyclists from 17 countries and 3 different length rides plus an off-road ride every day. A big beer tent with the Tour de France on a big screen soon gave rise to friendships and a group of Russian girls who needed to 'sing for their suppers' turned up at later rallies. Economic needs enforced them riding a large part of the way and with many loaves of bread and ham.

A handout for the German Rally in the ex-DDR attracted us, as we had never been there, so off we went. The first three days were in Gera and followed on by four days in Bad Blankenburg, where literally 'treading water' was a highlight of the evenings. I did the 'A'-ride on the Sunday and after an hour of riding, there was an almighty loud complaining from the club's back-marker. "You are supposed to greet any guests, not talk amongst your own club members." Jürgen, just the man for me I thought, and later he was to accompany us on a week's tour into the Czech Republic. He recommended getting a week-end train to begin with, a cheap day pass allowed unlimited travel on Sundays. There were lots of laughs and surprises not least the border in the middle of some woods, which I thought would be secretive but on arrival it was full of cigarette booths! A fussy BandB owner, who asked us to peg out our clothes more orderly on the line, also raised a smile.

Three further German rallies have been enjoyed by Anni and I in Kiel, the Baltic Coast and this year in Bonn. There, a strange hostel awaited some of our German colleagues: a large shed had many small but old caravans

inside, which with tables and chairs in front were quirky, but dry. Alongside, 2 railway sleeper wagons gave only tiny space so were not so popular. All immaculately clean. With Jürgen and fellow Club Solidarity Gera, we had some steady 50 miles trips out into the flattish Rhineland countryside.

For anyone interested, the German 2017 rally is also in a flat area, Hannover. Check it out at www.brt2017.de. The European rally is in Luxembourg and there will no doubt be the usual rallies in Belgium, Sweden and of course the 'biggy' the French Semaine Federale.

Fancy them? It's something different and may bring lifelong friendships even after Brexit.

Additional information

We found our own accommodation, near the Gera club who we know members of. Also in the past, the organisation provided lists and we booked separately. Unfortunately, late booking this year only allowed up to the Thursday night near our friends, but other Gera folk arrived and found hotels in Bonn on arrival. So, if you are not so bothered where you stay as a single entry, late booking of accommodation should be possible.

There are entry costs. We paid per day that we were there: 7 Euros per day. There will be an all-in cost for a week. Sufficient snacks and drinks at the stops. No need to buy a lunch anywhere.

The HQ had a lot of information, as to what there was to do nearby. Also, I think the German Fed organises their annual conferences at that time. 😹

Albert Brazier

It has come to my notice that this gentleman was prominent in Essex and, particularly, Southend CTC activities in the 1920's and 30's. He was one of the founding members of the first Southend Section, later its secretary, and for a time was the Essex DA treasurer. The last mention of him seems to be his call up midway through the war years.

Why am I interested? Well my paternal grandfather was named Albert Brazier. He moved to Rayleigh from north Essex in about 1916 and


remained there for the rest of his life. Four of his five children subsequently also remained in south east Essex.

However, there is no recollection among our family of this Albert having any involvement with cycling $\,$ It has been confirmed that he never even learned to ride a bicycle. Nor was he called up during the 1939 - 45 war. He had served during the 1914 - 18 conflict, and would have been too old by 1939.

There is no knowledge in the family of another, younger, "Albert Brazier".

So, is this a simple co-incidence, or is there an unknown branch of my family with cycling genes that have been mysteriously passed down to me?

Does anyone have any reliable information? If so I would be delighted to hear from them. 🚜
