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
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Member Groups' Reports

Chelmsford Member Group

December 18, 2016 - A Sunday ride to Witham in various degrees of mist and fog – There were only two at the start in Chelmsford, Dave S and John B (leader). Dave R and I joined them at the "Fig Tree" in Maldon for elevenses. A crowd from Essex Roads, which passed me on Mundon Road shared the room with us and were very noisy.

The visibility had improved by the time John took us off to Witham coming in from the north over the huge railway bridge. "The Battisford Court" (Wetherspoons) was relatively quiet and presented no problem finding a table. Dave S bought the drinks; what a nice man! We were then joined by Phil and caught up with his news.

Only Dave R was interested in a tea stop, so took himself off to Terling. The rest of us made our way south splitting near Woodham Walter, three to Chelmsford area and me back to Wickford. Ride length 47 miles and ending with all lights flashing. **Mel Martin**

Sunday 8 January – Ride to BHN Pot Plants and Maldon - Despite a typical drab early January day 8 riders turned up for the start. Our elevenses destination at "BHN Pot Plants" is too near for the first leg of a full day's ride, so I led the group on an indirect route via Writtle, Loves Green, Fryerning, Ingatestone and Hanningfield reservoir. We took in the lane via Warren Road and Chalk Street, which makes a nice alternative to the relatively busy road to South Hanningfield.

At elevenses we met up with 4 more riders but 3 went home before the 9 remaining set off for lunch at Maldon. I had been off cycling for 4 weeks, so I was not on peak form and even in normal circumstances that peak is pretty low! So I rued having included in the route the demanding hill up Edwin's Hall Road to the radio masts. The rest of the group had already been encouraged not to stay behind me and duly waited at the top.

At lunch our numbers were boosted further when we met up with Brian and John D at "The Rose and Crown". By the time we left the sun was shining and the dull day had turned into an exceptionally pleasant one for the time of year.

Gradually the group dispersed on the return to Chelmsford with 3 riders having tea at "Bunsey Downs".

I arrived home with 49 miles on the clock. Martin Cockersole

January 22, 2017 - Cool ride to "The Viper" on Sunday 22nd January - I wasn't surprised that we didn't get the full complement of riders out as it was very cold. The BBC said it would be -1 deg C at 9 o'clock and I'm pretty sure when the four of us left Chelmsford it was still below zero!

As we went onto Woodhill Road, we found a fog dense enough for me to put my lights on, which cleared as we climbed up to Danbury. I stopped near the top for us to regroup and loan, who been following close behind me sat down on the kerb. I thought he was just having a rest, but when Martin, who knows him better, caught up he realised loan wasn't well. We think it was a combination of a bug and the cold. Martin escorted him back to Chelmsford.

This left Dave S and me to continue onto Billericay for elevenses. At the Wetherspoons we met Diana and Brian. Brian was in civvies having declared it too cold to ride. Diana was up for a ride, so after a good chat we set off on a loop through Shenfield and Doddinghurst. I had been asked to keep the pace down, which was no problem and I lopped off a mile of my original route. Although we had been riding on white frost it wasn't until Beggar Hill we found our first real ice where water had run across the road. A text from Martin saying he was trying to reserve a table at the pub hastened our progress. John B had also made it to "The Viper". As we vacated our table a Southend Forty Plus rider and his friends grabbed it, such was the demand!

On Beggar Hill Diana had picked up a slow puncture so the first thing on getting outside was to fix it. Dave S didn't shy away from getting his hands dirty!

An afternoon tea stop was never a serious consideration and after a couple of miles we all headed home in various directions.

January 29, 2017 - A mild weather ride to Purleigh - I left Wickford with the SEG's, but after a couple of miles we parted company, as I headed off to meet the Chelmsford Group at Heybridge Basin. Led by John B they had just arrived, as I turned up at "The Lock Café". With much

rearrangement of the furniture we all got seated together, but then head honcho Adrian turned up so another chair was purloined.

To reach "The Bell" at Purleigh John put in a small loop through Langford, Hoe Mill and Woodham Mortimer. At Cock Clarks we met the SEG's making their way to "The Fox and Hounds" nearby.

Brian T had made his own way to "The Bell" and was seated at a large round table. It was reserved for another party, but we had it until 13:30. It was no problem as the food was served quickly.



On our return ride after Bicknacre we were down to six riders. At East Hanningfield, John, Dave S and Dave R were going right to "Butts Green Garden Centre" and Brian, Diana and I were going left for home. This didn't happen until we had a good chat, which included discussing Airey Houses because we had stopped beside a

row of them. These were prefabricated houses built after WWII and later suffered a number of defects including structural and lack of insulation. At least two of the houses beside us had been modified.

The BBC had forecast heavy rain from any time after noon, but it never materialised on my way home. **Mel Martin**



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Member Groups' Reports - cont'd.

South East Essex Informal Member Group

1st January 2017 – Mill Green - The first ride of the New Year saw only two brave souls (Jon C & Ian M) out on their bikes. Did everybody else have hangovers or were they put off by the forecast? From Wickford we went up Brock Hill to Hanningfield Reservoir, then to Stock and down Swan Lane to Margaretting, where we turned left onto the B1002 towards Ingatestone. Half way along this road we turned left to visit the 15th century St. Margaret's Church and had to wait at the level crossing for two trains to pass before entering beside Margaretting Hall. In Ingatestone we went through the A12 underpass and headed to Mill Green and "The



Viper" and arrived at noon. We were joined by John S, Lynda C, Ken W & Peter H who came in separate cars. After a good meal and pleasant conversation (which is unusual for me and John), we headed home, but stopped at the "Hanningfield Reservoir Visitor Centre" for a coffee and cake. We had to don our wet weather gear when we

15th January - Ramsden Heath - Only six (Ron S, Ian M, Graham R, Jim C, Karen & Paul H) at Wickford for the trip to Margaretting and the

22nd January – Bicknacre - The advertised ride to Hatfield Peverel and Maldon was abandoned by the run's leader due to the very foggy and potentially icy conditions and a morning only ride was taken to the "White Elm Tearoom". The thick fog around Wickford and Battlesbridge was replaced with bright sunshine at Rettendon, East Hanningfield and Bicknacre. Two new riders (Henry P and Peter R) joined the eight others for tea and cake.

29th January – Cock Clarks - Twelve left Wickford for the ride to the "Moulsham Café" in Chelmsford, which was a new venue for the SEG's. We did lose Mel M, who was riding with the Chelmsford MG, and Colin D, who left at Stock (was it something I said?). We also temporarily lost Brian P and his small group due to his inability to read a map given to him by the run's leader and he was only saved by the expert map reading skills of Paul H. We were joined later in the café by Martin P, who had ridden directly from home.

Seven continued onto the "Fox and Hounds", where we had free sandwiches, chips and crisps laid on by the landlady Michelle, as it was her last day running the pub. 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Back pocket notes: Japan

October 13th, 2015. Flew over a fully visible snow-capped Mt Fuji ... What a start to the trip!

Four uniformed staff bow deeply to us as we leave the main Kyushu airport. Respect indeed!

Our first few miles of pedalling via Suizenji Park and its marvellous Japanese gardens. In the afternoon, not sure of where we will stay, but outside a convenience store we are told about Hinagu Spa, a hot-springs village and find a small inn with character, ran by an old lady and her tipsy brother. We enjoy a hot soak.

A narrow coast road, 2 mts wide in places and partly abandoned. Lovely.

The dreaded tunnels that give us, especially Anni, nightmares before we travel out. However, most were lit and had separated cycle paths with safety barriers. No problem, but we affix rear-lights.

Sakurajima volcano right in front of our Kagoshima hotel window. What a view of the sunrise! In the town, grass planted on the volcanic concrete of the tramways helps reduce the temperature in the city. What infrastructure Japan has, everything seems to work perfectly! A day off in this scenic town, before taking a short ferry ride the next day.

In the mountains, crossing to Moyakonojo, we use 'yellow' roads shown on our 'Mapple' road atlas. Steep, but all ridable. Leaving the hotel to go and eat; a couple of technicians take us under their wing and we taste all sorts of shell-fish, bar-b-q'd fish and pork; all washed down with beer, saki and sochi (sweet potatoe wine).

Road 222, quiet through wooded valleys to Nichinan.

Surfers riding big waves near the 'washboard' rocks on the scenic coast road heading to Aoshima.

Ride through impressive sports stadiums in Miyazaki's outskirts.

At Hyuga, a struggle to find accommodation, until we see a sign to a friendly Minchuku right on the shale beach. A relaxing beer on our balcony overlooking the sea and boats out fishing until it's time for a hot shower/ soak and a tasty meal on the tatame matted floor.

In Nobeoka, a lively street festival with food and drink and shown to an excellent business hotel by a rare English speaker. He also gave us the address of his family farm Minshuku for the next night.

As ever, soaring Kites in the wooded hills after a cliff-hugging coast road. At the farm, 3 generations sit together for their meals after a day of toil on the land. Home grown aubergines, salmon from their fish-farm - all delicious. A fair amount of English spoken by the father and sons, who had visited USA.

In Saiki, eat in the hotel-supplied 'homewear', these business hotels have everything a traveller needs. From a heated WC/ bidet to a TV for the weather forecast to a kettle / tea-bags. Plenty of them around railway stations. A day off after seeing the sunrise over the low-rise town, through a gap in a hill over the bay and over distant mountains. Plenty to do, a history museum, hill-top castle location for a picnic, tea garden, Interchange Hall with lots of interest and rooms just to relax in.

A flat road immediately next to the sea for miles and at Gyoran Falls a nice temple to spend time at, but we somehow miss the hotels at Sagonoseki and have to pedal in the dark to Tsurusaki on the outskirts of Oita. However, the hotel had a private hot bath, so we soak away the extra day's miles.

Ride the wide river's banking cycle path out to the sea and views of fireships, coastguard boats. At the Oita hotel, a UCI cycle team's mechanics are hard at work and present us with new water bottles. Christmas trees for sale (remember, this is not totally a Christian country) and happy shoppers, no sign of the recession that Japan declares a few days later.

We tie up with our friends, who we knew in UK when he worked with me, for a couple of days sightseeing (on 4 wheels) around the massive Mt Aso crater. An interesting guest house; the first evening there we enjoyed a drink on arrival looking out towards Mt Unzen. We catch the bright colours of the Autumn leaves. After many years of trying, Kiyoshi finally tempts us to partake in Karaoke at a cosy bar, where he and Anni were stars of the show! The southern part of Amakusa was Christian and there are still churches that survived the centuries of isolation.

Bidding them good-bye, there was chance in the afternoon to ride up into the steep hills on narrow roads, only for Anni to forget her notes and postcards in a Post Office.

En-route to the ferry, we divert a few miles, but the post-office where Anni's documents were, was closed (holiday). However, the friendly

bakery opposite called the post-master, who not only came to unlock his office but presented us with small gifts. We were expecting to be admonished. In Obama, a big hotel and a great sunset from our bedroom after treading water in the hot-springs' 105 metre water trough. Very relaxing to the joints - hot, cold, hot, cold, etc. etc.

Lots of climbing up through Unzen Spa and its hot vents / sulphur fumes via beautiful Autumn coloured woods and then a long descent and a busy flat coast road to Isahaya.

From Isahaya a return train ride into Nagasaki to experience the Peace Park and Dejima port. Very moving.

How could we not stop at Tara, where roadside stops were bar-b-q'ing scallops and prawns? So we had our first lunch of the tour. Later, Kashima was a nice, quiet town with agriculture all the way to the sea.

It was forecast rain at 3pm the next day, as we planned to stay at Ogi. However, hotels there were full and we had to divert backwards to Saga, where we arrived 5 minutes before the rain.

It only remained one day back to Fukuoka. However, there was the Mitsuse Pass and a full day of rain to beware of. In addition my brakes seemed to have seized up due to the inner Teflon dislodging. Luckily it did not rain. So there we were: a four week tour without getting wet. Soon found boxes for the return flights home via an overnight stop near Tokyo to have dinner at our friend's new family and grandson. A lovely end to the trip.
